In the view of the authors academic social medicine is "medicine in relation to populations" and this book aims to cover subject matter which will assist medical students and others to understand the role of medicine in society. It is concerned broadly with an appraisal of the problems confronting medicine and the means available for their solution. This subject is considered under three headings: an examination of the problems of sickness and death; an assessment of the methods which contribute to health; and an evaluation of services through which resources are mobilized. These themes are intended to provide the basis of instruction which it is hoped will make future health workers better acquainted with the nature of the medical task and the complexity of the setting in which it must be tackled.
