Rationing in Action

It is becoming increasingly obvious that there are not enough resources in the health service to do everything that is possible for all patients. Most doctors accept that some kind of priority setting or rationing of health care is inevitable. But the burning issues are: how should the available resources be distributed? – Is it, for example, more important to finance hip replacements or screening for breast cancer? Who should make these painful decisions? How can public views be accommodated?

Rationing in Action, grown out of a conference organised by the *BMJ*, *BMA*, and *King's Fund*, discusses the inevitability of rationing; the challenges; what it means to patients, doctors, and managers; and possible solutions. Written by doctors, managers, politicians, economists, and philosophers, this is an important book for anyone involved in decision making in medicine.
